## Selecting the Right Ergo Assessment Tool

There are some really good resources to help you determine the correct ergonomic assessment tool to use when evaluating a job or task.

The first we recommend is the AIHA Ergonomic Tool Kit. It provides information on a variety of ergonomic assessment tools and was created to help individuals with varying experience. The Tool Kit is comprised of 20 ergonomic assessment tools for a variety of jobs and tasks found in the workplace.
